
2015 was a year of accomplishments. Although the city continues to grow and our calls for service continue to increase, our crime rate has remained constant and we saw a small decrease in the number of reportable vehicle accidents.

Our first Citizens Police Academy was held with an outstanding group of men and women learning about their police department and the situations we deal with on a daily basis. And of course we learned about their concerns. We strengthened our relationship with Lake Travis Independent School District and were proud to have officers participate in the homecoming parade and to escort the Cavaliers football team through town on the way to the state championship game in Houston. We look forward to their return trip next year.


The community support we receive is rewarding. Individual officers and the department were recognized with awards from the local Mothers Against Drunk Drivers. Officer Ryan Halley completed a rigorous six week program at the Texas Department of Public Safety and earned certification as a Personal Trainer from the Coopers Institute and certification as an Advanced Physical Fitness and Readiness Assessment Instructor from D.P.S. We have implemented the D.P.S. fitness standards for all new and current officers, and we are proud to be one of the most fit police departments in Texas.

We linked our records system with Lakeway Police Department so we can share records of incidents reported to either city. This also allowed the use of iPads in each patrol car to allow officers to communicate with dispatch and to view and submit reports from the field. In December we launched the Texas Department of Transportation accident software which enables officers to complete accident reports and submit them electronically to the state.

Our greatest strengths will always be the individuals who work for the Bee Cave Police Department and our newest officers have strengthened this organization. We our proud of the public trust we have worked to achieve during our decade of service to the Bee Cave community.






# Calls for Service

There were 10,767 calls for service in 2015. Calls for service are all calls, both dispatched and officer generated which include traffic stops, close patrol and requests from citizens.




# Incidents

863 reported incidents in 2015. Incidents are specific to calls for service where a report was made and submitted by the police department.




## Arrests

There were 430 arrests in 2015 (10 Class C, 340 on view, and 80 warrant). Arrests are identified as custodial arrests from either cite and release to individuals being taken to Travis County Jail for processing. These numbers do not include class C traffic citations.




# Driving While Intoxicated Arrests

### Enforcement Trends & Efforts




The City of Bee Cave also approved an ordinance requiring hands free operation of cell phones and electronic devices while operating a motor vehicle or bicycle. Distracted driving causes accidents.



Traffic remains the top concern and complaint from Bee Cave Citizens and visitors. We increased our efforts during 2015 to address those concerns and are pleased to report the number of accidents reportable to the state decreased from 260 to 240. Sadly one of those accidents resulted in the death of one young man.

We believe the drop in accidents is the result of three factors:

- 1. Increase in enforcement, both citations and warnings.
- 2. Increase in DWI arrests.
- 3. Major highway construction on Highway 71 completed.



## Training and Continuing Education

Continuing and Mandated Education is always on the schedule for the Bee Cave Police Department. Each year, sworn officers are required to attend and complete a minimum number of hours and specialized topic courses which are required by TCOLE (Texas Commission on Law Enforcement), in order to maintain a peace officers license. Occasionally training opportunities arise and when time and scheduling permit, we are able to send sworn officers to additional training. These courses can be from administrative to tactical training opportunities which provide officers advancement and additional training hours above the minimums. In addition, the recognition program requires training and other standards to be maintained as part of the recognition program.





Sometimes training arises out of necessity. For example, given the number of collisions and DWI cases we have seen recently, the Bee PD has trained 4 officers as Certified Breath Test Operators through the Texas DPS Academy. Not only are these officers SFST Certified (Standardized Field Sobriety Practitioners), they are now certified to operate any state intoxilyzer machine where the subject provides a breath sample to determine the level of alcohol concentration in the subjects body. This is a huge accomplishment and benefit for the BCPD as the number of DWI cases and arrests have risen in 2015.

Several officers have been trained in Commercial Vehicle Enforcement to recognize violations of the large numbers of commercial traffic in Bee Cave. Due to the high volume of construction and businesses in the southwest Travis County area and Bee Cave being a major transit point, commercial vehicle traffic is high. This training gives the officers the knowledge to recognize an unsafe commercial vehicle and the additional knowledge while investigating a commercial vehicle collision.





Also, we have one officer who has attended the TEEX (Texas A&M Engineering Extension) training for Intermediate and Advanced Collision Investigation. This training provides the BCPD the tools and education to properly document a collision scene, analyze the cause, and the functionality of using formulas to determine factors like, speed, distance traveled and completion of accurate and scaled diagrams of the collision scene.
