LETTER FROM THE CHIEF OF POLICE

We are pleased to present our Bee Cave Police Department Annual Report for 2020. This report contains statistical and informational data about our department and our daily activities. There is value in reviewing your work, from a daily review to this look back at an entire year, as we continue to serve as guardians for this community.

The Covid-19 pandemic was a major influence on every activity this past year. From in person citizen contacts, response to calls, traffic stops and arrests, every role and responsibility of this department was altered for the safety of our citizens and our officers. Some of the statistical data contained in this report was significantly impacted from prior years. Officers were suddenly wearing N-95 face coverings on all in person contacts. We responded to calls for service for violations of orders issued by the Travis County Judge and the Governor's Office, as rules were adopted to limit the spread of this virus. And officers faced an invisible danger to their health, one we had little preparation or training for. As we begin 2021, with the knowledge vaccines are available, the precautions we have taken will continue for months to come.

This annual report contains significant accomplishments from 2020. Even with the pandemic, we continued in person response to most calls for service and strengthened our relationship with the business community. And the support we continued to receive, from our citizens and visitors, provided support for our officers as guardians of our community. Although many communities witnessed an erosion of public trust between their police departments and their citizens, we built on our foundation of trust and we believe are stronger for that effort.

It truly is an honor to lead this agency and have a committed group of police officers and civilians who strive to provide excellent service to our community. In conclusion, we look forward to 2021, and the opportunity to "Protect the Hive."

For 2020, Senior Officer Scott Olson was selected as the Officer of the Year for the second time in three years. The selection is not for one outstanding arrest or incident, but for a series of acts over the entirety of the year and may include notable or unusual arrests or incidents.

Although Officer Olson continues to be in the top performance level in comparison to his peers, the quality of his work stood out to supervisors and to individuals outside the police department.

Olson serves as the Selective Traffic Enforcement Supervisor for our department, as a Field Training Officer, and is a Drug Recognition Expert and assists other officers with drug related DWI arrests. Olson appeared in a department video announcing a DWI enforcement weekend, worked many of the STEP hours during the year, and passed recertification for Drug Recognition Expert. Officer Olson was recognized by the Bee Cave Municipal Court Judge and Prosecutor for his excellent court testimony and demeanor.



Officer Katayama assisted our department by production of a various public service videos on topics from vehicle burglary, DWI enforcement, COVID safety protocols and a blood drive held at Bee Cave Police Department. Officer Katayama willingly took on this project and recorded, reviewed, and edited the video and presented a professional grade product.

Additionally, Katayama created and manages a Department website, Instagram account, and YouTube channel. These various platforms paved multiple avenues for information and productions to be disseminated to the public and increased our visibility, transparency, and professional appearance as a Department. After becoming aware of a shortage of blood in the local blood bank, Officer Matthew Stevko took the initiative and contacted We Are Blood to book a mobile blood drive in the Bee Cave Police Department parking lot. The event was booked solid. Officer Stevko led by example as he donated blood and convinced both the City Manager and Police Chief to be donors. Over the next few months, Officer Stevko booked three additional mobile blood drives, all of which were a success. More than 100 people donated vitally needed blood due to Officer Stevko's initiative.

Sgt. Keith Howard was recognized by Mothers Against Drunk Drivers and the Bee Cave Police Department for his efforts as a patrol supervisor in assisting his officers in their DWI enforcement efforts. Sgt. Howard has encouraged each officer to make DWI enforcement a priority for his shift. For helping in every way and for encouraging a professional effort from his officers, Sgt. Howard was selected to receive this honor. Officer Garret Hawkins was recognized by Mothers Against Drunk Drivers and the Bee Cave Police Department for leading the department's efforts in enforcement of driving while intoxicated statutes. Hawkins was also recognized in 2019 for his efforts. Every DWI arrest is a potential lifesaving event and Officer Hawkins efforts and his professional and accurate report writing and field sobriety testing is an asset to this agency.

For attaining the highest score in the annual Concept II Row test, Sgt. Joe Reid is recognized as the Fittest Guardian. Sgt. Reid also supervises the Fittest Shift, and encouraged and led those officers by example, to be physically ready for their daily duties.

The Law Enforcement Recognition Program is a voluntary process where police agencies in Texas prove their compliance with 166 Texas Law Enforcement Best Practices. These Best Practices were carefully developed by Texas Law Enforcement professionals to assist agencies in the efficient and effective delivery of service, the reduction of risk and the protection of individual's rights.

While similar in nature to the national accreditation program, the Best Practices Recognition Program is easier to administer, lower in cost and is designed specifically for Texas Law Enforcement. The Texas Legislature demands a great deal of professional law enforcement in Texas and the Best Practices were specifically designed to aid Texas agencies in meeting those demands and providing the best quality of service to the people of our State.

The Bee Cave Police Department was re-recognized in 2020 and has been a recognized agency since 2012.

STEP Grant

Texas' Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) is a federally funded law enforcement grant program run by the Traffic Safety Division at the Texas Department of Transportation. STEP enforcement is focused on reducing crashes and crash-related injuries and deaths in and across Texas. Any accredited law enforcement agency in Texas is eligible for funding through STEP, though priority to receive the funds and the maximum funding amount an agency may receive is based on the number and type of crashes occurring in the applicant jurisdictions.

Agencies participating in STEP must use crash data provided by the Texas Crash Reporting Information System (CRIS), and analyzed and plotted by the Texas Department of Public Safety's Highway Safety Operations Center (HSOC), to develop Enforcement Zones, which are limited in number and size to help magnify the impact of the enforcement efforts on troublesome crash areas.
