

Chief's Message



If asked to describe 2017, in a single word I would say "challenging." A year which saw snow, continued growth in our community, an increase in most of our statistical categories, and working short staffed while trying to fill four open slots most of the year. But a challenging year often raises your level of performance and by years end; I believe we could also say the year was successful for the Bee Cave Police Department.

The largest single line item in any police budget is salary, and Bee Cave is no exception to that rule. Salary points to people, officers and civilians, who make up a police department. And these people are the most important asset in this department. When I started in this career many years back, I wasn't focused on the department's budget, my focus was on doing my job on the street. As the chief my responsibility includes the budget and work with our elected officials to ensure the public's expectations of their police department are met.

An obvious goal for 2018 is officer retention, we have invested time and effort with these individuals as members of this department, and when an officer leaves we lose the knowledge, skills and abilities that individual brought to the Bee Cave Police Department. And the cost of hiring and training a new officer begins again. The majority of our officers live some distance outside Bee Cave, and they have the added expense of travel and time to commute to work each day, and often drive past other departments trying to fill open slots. This is a top priority.

This report is a highlight of many of our activities for 2017. We included data for a longer time frame to provide a more in depth look at some of the changes impacting Bee Cave and the Bee Cave Police Department over the last five years.

Our biggest challenge last year came in filling four police officer positions which came open as officers left Bee Cave for other law enforcement opportunities. In addition to the legal requirements to be a police officer, we look for individuals who will be the right fit for Bee Cave. Add in a competitive environment for police officers and retention of officers is critical. At years end we had filled three of the four open positions with officers who we believe will be a good representative of the Bee Cave Police Department.

We look forward to 2018 and the challenges we will face, together, with those of you who call Bee Cave home.










159% Increase in Traffic Stops from 2013 - 2016 17% Decrease in Motor Vehicle Accidents from 2014 - 2016

MOTOR VEHICLE ACCIDENTS




CRIME INDEX



The Crime Index is the total number of Homicide, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary of Residence Or Building, Theft, Auto Theft and Arson.


